Couple's gift to hospital aids grieving parents

Emma and Ashley Hubble, alongside their five-yearold daughter Alicia and Tracey McGurrell from the 4Louis charity, presented a cuddle cot to neonatal specialist nurse, Nikki Farrington.

The couple started their campaign Hollie's Army in memory of their daughter Hollie Ann Hubble.

Cuddle cots are specialised pieces of equipment that are designed to fit inside a Moses basket and keep babies cool to extend the time families can spend with them.



Emma said they arranged a number of fundraising activities including raffles, tombolas and a cake sale.

Football team Halas Hawks Veterans FC also contributed by having their football kit altered to include Hollie's Army on their shorts and jackets. They held a boxing match and raised £200 towards the family's funds. A sponsored trek up Snowdon was also completed with a ball being held on February 2nd, in honour of Hollie's first birthday as the grand finale.

Overall a grand total of £21,800 was raised, including an impressive £780 from the raffle drawn at the ball.



Homemade hampers donated to ease future parents' stay

A former patient who wanted to provide essential items for parents on the neonatal ward has donated several hampers.

Rebecca Bates and 16 month old daughter Emma presented the handmade hampers, as well as a Moses basket, to neonatal specialist nurse, Nikki Farrington.

Following the loss of their daughter Daisy Georgina Bates, born in April 2019, Rebecca and her husband Dan set up Perfect Preemie where they put together hampers to donate.

The couple decided to donate their first set of hampers to The Royal Wolverhampton NHS Trust in Daisy's memory.

With the help of the community, Rebecca hopes to expand Perfect Preemie to further enhance the support for bereaved parents within hospitals.

Help us to help more patients and their families through Gift Aid

Gift Aid allows UK charities to claim back the basic rate tax already paid on

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donations by the donor. This means we can claim back from the government 25p for every £1 donated, boosting the value of the donation at no additional cost to the donor!

During the next year, if each donor said yes to Gift Aid, we could raise an extra $\pm 125,000 - so$ you can see why this is so important.
